**Annual Report to the Congregation
Rabbi Donald P. Cashman, D.D.
42nd Annual Meeting – June 2, 2013**

I'm honored to be giving my 28th Annual report, at this, the 42nd Annual Meeting of B'nai Sholom Reform Congregation.

It's a beautiful Sunday morning in June, and those of us who run this place are grateful that you've allocated some time to be here for this important Rite of Spring, the Annual Meeting. I'm sure that each of us would rather be doing something else, but being Jews, we understand the idea of mitzvah, of sacred obligation. Part of that obligation is seeing to the welfare of our Beit Knesset, House of Assembly; Bet T'filah, House of Prayer; and Beit Midrash, House of Study. We do this as a cooperative venture, plotting out priorities with a budget, and supporting our leadership with our votes.

Last year at this time I spoke of some new ventures, and today I'd like to report on them.

We chose last year to be one of the Pilot sites for a new Reform Jewish service for Yom Kippur afternoon. Some were involved in the reading and leading of the service; others filled out questionnaires and submitted comments; others still participated in a conference call. Some new material was liked, and some not. Some old material was missed, and some was not. I can tell you that they've since named the book, *Mishkan Nefesh*, (Dwelling place of the Soul), and they've targeted a publication date about two years hence. I'm sure we'll buy a sample copy. Meanwhile, we will probably cherry-pick a few items to include in this year's service.

A second new venture aimed to increase the observance, and the meaning, of the observance of Yahrtzeit. Heretofore a Yahrtzeit was name in the bulletin that was read on Friday night. I have been reaching out to people in advance of the Yahrtzeit, inviting them to host the Oneg Shabbat in memory of their loved one, and if desired, to lead one of the Psalms that night. I am told that I successfully made the shidduch for almost a dozen Ongai Shabbat. If you're wondering "How come I wasn't contacted?" it means something else was scheduled, or someone else was asked and accepted. *You* could be pro-active – some people have been – and make the arrangement to host the Oneg more than 2 or 3 months in advance.

A completely different type of new program was something I entitled "A Conversation," which was a series of sessions for our members who are not Jews. We met five times, focusing mostly on the holidays: the Days of Awe, Hanukkah, Purim, Passover, and a session on the role of Israel in modern Jewish thought. We had never done anything especially directed to this cohort within our congregation, and I think it was a valuable step.

Last November, you may recall, I travelled with 10 rabbis and 3 cantors to Central Europe. I thought I was going to Eastern Europe, but the people who live there think of Eastern Europe as "Russia," and we were in the Czech Republic,

Hungary, and Poland. It was an amazing voyage to several places of significant Jewish interest: Prague, home to the Maharal, and his Golem, and later to a fairly assimilated Jewish community; the nearby Terezin concentration camp; Budapest, whence huge numbers were sent off to Auschwitz in the final years of the War; and Krakow, which has a burgeoning Jewish cultural presence, but sadly comes nowhere near the significance that Krakow held centuries ago as the 16th century home of R. Moshe Isserles. Our pilgrimage to Auschwitz was a profound experience, proving again that all the photographs, movies, and books cannot have the impact of being there: of seeing the scope, of walking through the barracks, into the gas chambers, and seeing the crematoria. As I reported when I returned, the high point of my professional career was when I chanted, at the invitation of my colleagues, El Malei Rahamim there in front of the Gas Chambers at Auschwitz-Birkenau. From there we moved on to Warsaw, where the Ghetto was our primary focus, which helped us here as it was our turn to host the community Yom HaShoah observance in this year that commemorates the 70th anniversary of the historic uprising.

To be sure, not everything that was new this year was a momentous. We had our first ever Purim Gragger contest. More significant, I think, is that we offered for the first time in over 20 years a morning Adult Education class to huge success. This is the result of not only a changing demographic, but of the continual growth of people looking for meaningful ways to spend time.

Another new Adult activity was a monthly, or less so, "Song Session," where people came to sing. Our Adult Education offerings have been growing and growing, and are a significant piece of what we do. One aspect of that was our 40th anniversary Shabbaton, which involved so many people in the congregation. Other pieces of the 40th anniversary celebration was the Mitzvah program, and the closing Gala. Many people worked to make these activities happen, and lest I forget to mention anyone in particular, let me just say that the work of everyone involved was necessary for their success.

We hosted guest speaker Doreen Rappaport to talk about her new book. Aside from her fascinating presentation, it was made possible by concerted efforts of several different committees within the congregation working together, which in and of itself was an important event.

Many of our usual activities reached special milestones. Our monthly study of the Prophets has finally reached the last section, the 12 Minor prophets, and in perhaps in a year we'll actually finish the Prophets and move on to the third section of the Bible.

In my evening course, we studied the Ethics of Eating, the fourth or fifth year we have concerned ourselves with Reform Jewish practice. Next year, as you may have read about in the June bulletin, we'll be looking at some of the high points of the Talmud and Midrash.

Our Tu B'shevat seder, long a popular activity, was held this past year for the first time as a brunch, since it fell on Shabbat. We believe we attracted some people for whom the evening hours are difficult, and we'll be continuing with that when the calendar permits.

Twice now we've done Kol Nidrei as a sing-a-long, and I'm pleased to report that my write-up of the program and some of the scholarship behind it will appear this month in the CCAR Journal: The Reform Jewish Quarterly.

I note with sorry the passing this year of two of our members: Enid Smith, who had been with us only a few years, and Max Kuperman, one of the founders of B'nai Sholom. May their memories be for a blessing.

While new programs and special events can be exciting, it is the everyday business of Jewish life that provides our focus. Week in and week out children and adults come to learn, families come to pray, people come to sustain this holy congregation.

All these happen due to the efforts of many different people. It is not because I want to save time that I do not mention them all by name, but rather I am afraid of leaving someone out. I will say that every participant at every event, every committee member, every volunteer, every member of the congregation contributes to the success of B'nai Sholom. Occasionally we quibble about the particulars of a some aspect of what we do, but the civility, the menschlichkeit, the devotion to the institution of B'nai Sholom and to Judaism have been on the highest levels, and it makes me proud to be associated with this synagogue, and to have the privilege of working with our devoted officers, Board members, and Committee Chairs, and staff members. I am grateful to you all for continued support of the congregation, and I look forward to your continuing support in the year to come.
