From our Rabbi...

Shavuot may be the Rodney Dangerfield of Jewish holidays: it gets no respect. As we learned from *Gypsy*, "You Gotta have a Gimmick," and Shavuot doesn't have anything that rivals the pizzazz of Hanukkah candles and presents, Rosh Hashanah's shofar blasts, Passover's seder, or the vegetation we wave at Sukkot. All Shavuot offers is the Ten Commandments as the Torah reading, and since the 16th century, the custom of **Tikkun Leil Shavuot**.

Tikkun? Leil Shavuot? *Institution[of study] for the night of Shavuot.*

On Saturday night, May 19, from 8:00 PM to 12:30 AM we're going to have a Tikkun Leil Shavuot, a 16th century Kabbalistic innovation of late-night (or all-night) study in honor of the giving of the Torah. They used to symbolize studying everything by reading a little bit from each book of the Bible, and from every Talmudic tractate. We'll encounter, study, and discuss a whole range of Jewish texts – biblical, rabbinic, medieval, and modern – and we'll eat and drink so that we have the proper fuel for energy.

The event is FREE, but to help fuel our evening (and so we know how many copies of things to make) please sign up to bring food or drink

It's customary to eat dairy foods at Shavuot, so the sign-up suggestions include many dairy ideas, but let's include some non-dairy items for those who need to or want to avoid dairy.

Our Purim Potluck was the best potluck ever, and I hope we can come close to the glory of that event!

We'll begin the evening noshing and schmoozing at 8, with Havdalah ending Shabbat at 8:30, so the event starts out child-friendly. We'll have several sessions of 30 minutes, with regular breaks to fill up our plates and cups, and some songs to clear our heads. Everyone is welcome to come and go, or drop by for a while during the evening.

If you have anything you've been dying to study, please let me know soon and I may be able to work it into the evening. If there is something you'd like to present, let me know as well.

And why late at night? Two reasons: 1) the Israelites were said to have fallen asleep before the Torah was given and Moses had to wake them, so we stay awake; and 2) for a brief moment at midnight the heavens open and God is especially welcoming of prayer.

I'm looking forward to this as an exciting and fun addition to our program. Don't forget to sign up for what you're going to bring!

Social Action: Make Compassion Bags

For years, driving north on the Everett Road overpass, we have continued to witness people standing with cardboard signs that inform us, the passing motorists, that these individuals are, "Homeless" and need assistance. All around our Capital District communities and throughout the United States, many drivers ask themselves, "What is the correct thing to do?" Averting one's eyes and continuing ahead seems pretty much the norm. An occasional car window opens and a few dollars pass to the seeker of cash. Although much appreciated, it may not always be the most beneficial action. How do you know if the person really does need assistance? It has been written, "There is no uniform for the homeless, their plumage is the same as yours."

If you research this issue, you can read of the many ways individuals and groups have chosen to address what can be an uncomfortable situation, in more positive ways. "Blessing Bags," or "Compassion Bags," as they are sometimes labeled, may not be the answer, and handing a stranger a package with some personal care items will surely not cure what ails our society, but it is a small way to teach our children, and ourselves, that we are all deserving of kindness.

How do you know if that person is a "professional beggar" or really homeless? The answer is that you either make the best judgement call you can make, or create the "Compassion Bags" and donate them to a soup kitchen or homeless shelter. Putting together some bags as a family to either keep in your car or drop off at an agency, is a great conversation starter to doing what we, as Jews, have been doing for years. Tikkun Olam, making the world better.

Some items to include in your bags:

Socks-wool is preferred due to its wicking properties...	Body lotion

Sunscreen	Breakfast bars- Not granola bars
Toothbrush and toothpaste	Peanut Butter Crackers

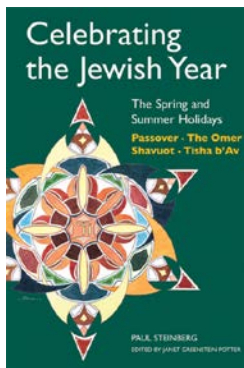
New In the library
