B'Yachad Update

The youth from B'nai Sholom continued their religious school education at B'Yachad, the community school for youth from B'nai Sholom, Temple Israel, and Congregation Ohav Shalom. Five youth from B'nai Sholom graduated from B'Yachad and enjoyed a school-wide celebration on a beautiful Mother's Day.

It was an exciting year, and students enjoyed several special events throughout the year, such as, the 5th grade Life Cycle programming, Havdalah celebrations, and learning about the Jewish holidays. The 8th graders enjoyed a trip to the food pantry to volunteer their services.

A new B'Yachad logo was designed by graphic designer, Rivi Bahir and adopted as the official logo. The multi-colored logo, in the form of a Jewish star, represents the three participating synagogues. Each hand was designed to represent the children, each holding a Jewish star of their synagogue. These hands join together (B'Yachad!) to form a larger Jewish star representing the union of the three synagogues.

Mark Silverbush and Maxine Goldberg continued to provide representation to both the B'Yachad Board as well as to the B'nai Sholom Religious School Committee. The B'nai Sholom Religious School Committee continues to meet on a regular basis to help plan activities for B'nai Sholom students and their parents to maintain a strong connection to our synagogue through such activities as parent education, T'filat Talmidim and other special events.

Mark and Maxine are currently serving on the search committee for a new Education Director.

BSRC Congregants Teach, Study Jewish Leadership

This winter and spring marked the first offering of the “Yesod” course in Jewish leadership, and B’nai Sholom was represented by both students and the teacher. Yesod is a new national leadership program of the Jewish Federations of North America, sponsored locally by our own Jewish Federation of Northeastern New York. BSRC congregant David Liebschutz, who teaches leadership and management courses at U. Albany and Siena and offers leadership consulting through his firm, DSLeadership, LLC, was hired by Federation to facilitate the course, which ran for eight sessions from January through May.

“What was unique about this course,” Liebschutz explains, “is that it was grounded in Jewish texts, which were then linked to current thinking and best practices about leadership. That really set it apart from a run-of-the-mill leadership class.” He continues, “I think it made for more in-depth, thoughtful discussions as people sought to find answers in a Jewish context.”

Also unique to the locally offered class was the diverse group of participants. Throughout the country, most Federations offered the course only to their staff and lay leaders. Locally, however, our Federation opted to offer it to all of the Jewish institutions in the community, soliciting nominations for participants from each. Consequently, the 24 students in the class were drawn from B’nai Sholom, Congregation Ohav Shalom, Temple Israel, Congregation Gates of Heaven, Congregation Shaaray Tefila (Glens Falls), Bet Shraga Hebrew Academy, Jewish Family Services, the Albany and Schenectady JCCs, Federation staff and its young leadership group, Next Dor, among others.

B’nai Sholom participants were board member and membership committee member Hana Sullenger and then-president-elect Libby Liebschutz. They enjoyed learning not only from the course materials and class presentations but also through the interaction with their fellow participants, who face common problems and situations. They and the other class members were recognized with certificates at the Federation of NENY’s annual meeting on June 9.

A second offering of the Yesod course will begin in January 2017. Anyone interested in participating should contact BSRC president Libby Liebschutz.

Congregants Elect Officers, Trustees and Rabbi and Approve Budget at Annual Meeting

B'nai Sholom held its annual congregational meeting on Sunday, June 5. After a dessert reception sponsored by the 2015-16 board members, congregants gathered in the sanctuary to hear reports and vote on important matters in the life of the congregation.

Rabbi Cashman began with a d'var Torah in celebration of Yom Yerushalayim, Jerusalem Day, which concluded at sundown that day. President Mimi Bruce's report noted the many accomplishments of the past year, particularly the many ways we improved B'nai Sholom's visibility: literally, through a new sign out front and decorative lighting along the front of the building; in the media and on the web through intensified communication efforts; and in the community through our new open policy at the Days of Awe. She noted the major fiscal accomplishments of concluding the year "in the black" and presenting a balanced budget for the year ahead, both largely thanks to our new tenant, Mayan Hands. She chronicled the array of events and projects of the past year, including the activities of the membership, ritual, social action, fundraising, adult education, religious school, youth, library, caring community, hospitality, scholarship, and cemetery committees.

So as not to duplicate the president's report of the past year, Rabbi Cashman's report focused on the year ahead. He noted that the synagogue will be undertaking a strategic planning effort in the year ahead, given that it has been about 10 years since the last effort. This planning will be particularly timely given the transitions that B'nai Sholom will be facing in several years.

Finance Vice President Liz Davis presented the budget for 2016-17 and answered questions before the congregation voted to approve it. The budget assumes few changes for the year ahead: no dues increase; the same number of congregants; and only minimal increases in salaries, the major expense category. As Mimi had pointed out earlier, the rent from Mayan Hands is essential to the balanced budget for the coming year.

Mimi recognized three retiring board members – Liz Davis, Mark Reeder, and Steve Klein – and presented them with gifts of Mayan Hands challah covers in appreciation for their service.

Nominating Committee chair Jodi Kerper presented nominations for trustees and officers, who were duly elected by the congregation. New to the board in the coming year are Josh Brody, Kevin Chorost, and Jeff Klamka. The officers for 2016-17 are Libby Liebschutz, president; Barbara Devore, president-elect; Joan Savitt, finance vice president; Ann Shapiro, vice president; Ellie Davis, treasurer; and Joel Bloom, secretary. Incoming president Libby Liebschutz recognized Mimi for two years of accomplishment as president and presented her with a challah cover featuring a creation scene.

Synagogue Scholar Program Concluded With "When is a Tent not a Tent"

Following Shabbat services on Friday evening June 10, the Adult Education Committee concluded its Synagogue Scholar Series with Steve Stark-Riemer's presentation on the weekly Torah portion, Bemidbar, or "When is a Tent not a Tent?" Steve discussed how in the Exodus from Egypt, the Israelite tribes camped around the portable wilderness sanctuary, the Tabernacle, also known as the "Tent of Meeting," highlighting how the Tent bore a remarkable similarity to the battle tent of Pharaoh Rameses II from centuries previous. Steve has taught numerous courses on the scientific study of the Biblical world at B'nai Sholom since 2007, and his insights as to the Tent of Meeting made for an enlightening evening transporting us back millennia.

New Books in the B'nai Sholom Library

The library committee uses most of its funds to purchase newly published books for the collection. This month we chose to buy a better copy of a book we already owned – *The Zionist Idea: A Historical Analysis and Reader*, edited by Arthur Herzberg (JPS, 1997). Many important writings from Jewish thinkers of the 19th and early 20th Century are included, from Theodor Herzl and Martin Buber to Louis Brandeis and Vladimir Jabotinsky. The Library Committee will miss the old copy (a 13th printing of the 1959 original edition) because a former owner wrote on the title page “Herzl rings true in my heart.” But the book is falling apart and it does not have Herzberg’s fine 1997 afterword. The final sentence of that afterword would also serve as an inspiration to begin the book. “A reconsideration of the past of Zionism, and of the ways to work together, which conflicting ideologies did once find, may help create a more hopeful future.”

For those interested in a snarkier, funnier, but sadly less hopeful look at how “we” got “here”, the library also has a copy of *Israel is Real: An Obsessive Quest to Understand the Jewish Nation and its History* by Rich Cohen (FSG, 2009).

NOTE: Since Cohen’s book includes Israeli history after 1949, it can be found in our Modern Israel section, which is in the back corner of the library. Book spines have white dots. Herzberg’s book, which contains writings before 1945, is in the History section. That’s in the middle of the back wall, with orange dots.
