From our Rabbi...

Another rabbi was telling me about a recent program at her synagogue, and how the week after, a congregant said "I wish I had known about it!" The rabbi sighed. "There was a full page notice in our Rosh Hashanah annual program booklet, a 'save-the-date' blurb had been in the monthly bulletin for the last 6 months, it was featured on our website for the last three months, and it was in the weekly e-mail for the last two months. For six weeks it had been pinned to the top of our Facebook; we did a hard copy mailing a month before, we created a Facebook event, put a sign on the front lawn, had a press release in the Jewish World, got a mention in the local paper. We even had an ad at the Spectrum. We did special email blasts a week before and two days before. And she wishes she had known about it!"

We all suffer from information overload. We have become numb to all the data, and notices, and advertisements directed toward us in print, on screens large and small, stationary and portable, and on the highways. How many times do we need to hear or see something before it clicks? The answer may be "one more time." After all, Pharaoh needed 10 notices before he got the message to let the Israelites go.

We've been aiming, for the last couple of months, to mail our monthly bulletin between the 21st and the 23rd of the month so as to have it in your hands soon enough (we think) before the month begins. The question is: once you get it, when – if ever- does it get opened and actually read? We know, since we switched to *Constant Contact*, that we have a very high percentage of people who open our weekly e-nnouncements. Anecdotally, we know that not everybody reads to the bottom.

With all this in mind, I am happy to remind you that at the end of May, just after Memorial Day, on TUESDAY, MAY 30 at 7:30 PM is the service for the festival of Shavuot, when we celebrate the traditional date of the giving of the Torah at Sinai. For over 200 years, Reform synagogues have held the ceremony of Confirmation on or near Shavuot, and I am pleased that four of our students will become Confirmed that evening. The students – Noah Degroult-Elias, Shira Novkov-Bloom, Ben Rethemeyer, and Hugh Smith – have not only completed 8th grade in our religious school program, but also completed 2 or more years of study in Mifgash, our communal high school program. Confirmation is conferred after that second year of high school study. These students all became Bar/Bat Mitzvah here at B'nai Sholom, and they are all – coincidentally or not? – involved in YOBS, our Youth Group. These students will speak briefly about the different formative Jewish experiences they have had: NFTY-NE, Religious School, URJ camp, and an Israel trip. In this, they represent important touchstones in forming Jewish adults. Their parents, as well, have served as role models by their involvement in the synagogue. We congratulate these students and their families on this achievement. I hope many will come out for this festival service, which includes the reading of the Ten Commandments from the Torah and a brief Yizkor, to honor these students and to wish *mazal tov* to their parents.

Following Shavuot, the next Jewish holiday is Rosh Hashanah, which begins on Wednesday evening, September 20. I am excited that we'll welcome the New Year with our new prayer book. You should have received a letter inviting you to contribute books. I bet you'll get more than one notice about that!

New Prayer Book for the Days of Awe

At its April meeting, the Board of Trustees of B'nai Sholom Reform Congregation adopted a new prayer book for the Days of Awe, Mishkan HaNefesh: Machzor for the Days of Awe. The two-book set (one volume for Rosh Hashanah, the other for Yom Kippur) is a companion to our daily prayer book Mishkan T'filah, and will replace Gates of Repentance. Prior to its adoption by the Board, Mishkan HaNefesh was explored and evaluated by several small congregant groups in several settings. The Ritual Committee, two Town Hall Meetings, and a three week class provided opportunities for interested congregants to be exposed to the new material while gaining an understanding of how it fits into the traditional liturgy for the Days of Awe. The new book offers both contemporary and familiar language. Gender sensitivity and general inclusiveness are strong elements. Congregant response has been that the new book will enhance the spiritual impact of the day, and "speaks better to everyone. Its language is current and the whole new experience is inspirational." Further feedback has been that "the material included (the new translations, the additional readings, even the introductory materials) deepens our understanding of what it means to be a Reform Jew, and of how our religion can inform our lives." Congregants have received an invitation to contribute to fund the purchase of the new books, and to have their loved ones honored or remembered through book plates. You may have noticed the boxes of Gates of Repentance out on the tables in the hallway. Very soon, these books with book plates reflecting donations will be set out in alphabetical order. You are invited to take any books with plates reflecting contributions from you.

Social Action Shabbat

In recent months, we have seen a marked increase in people who live in this country, taking to the streets. They are speaking-out for issues that they support and protesting against those which may run contrary to their personal ethics and values.

It was thus most timely that Justin Harrison, board member and chair of the Legal Committee for the New York Civil Liberties Union (NYCLU) - Capital Region Chapter, was the guest speaker at the April 28 Social Action Shabbat.

This year, with our focus on *Advocacy*, it was both informative and reaffirming to hear how the United States Constitution is written to protect our rights to free speech and assembly. With cell phone videographers making their presence known during most public gatherings, how comforting it was to learn that it can be very helpful to record assemblages that may attract and lead to interactions with law enforcement officials.

Mr. Harrison provided advice regarding engagement with counter-protesters ("trolls"), who may purposely try to incite an incident that could escalate to a physical altercation and lead to the police putting an end to the organized protest/march/rally. Basically, don't react or engage. The counter demonstrators have the same rights as those who are part of the scheduled "event". Although physical contact is not permitted, verbal disruption is.

We were left with several pieces of advice that this writer has taken to heart:


- If you are arrested at an organized demonstration, to quote Justin, "Nothing good comes from talking to the police in an adversarial situation."
- If you are a public employee who is participating in an organized demonstration, "Unless you are speaking as a representative of your agency and are asked to speak on its behalf, keep the agency's name and your position there in, out of the rally." You are also reminded to refrain from wearing clothing, including baseball caps, that have the agency's name or logo on it.

The Social Action Committee distributed a publication that was provided by the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) entitled: *Know Your Rights: Demonstrations and Protests*, that we are happy to provide to you. There may be dissent in Ginsburg's work, but there was none about the quality of this picture book biography of her. On its publication last September, it received starred reviews from both *School Library Journal* and *Booklist*. Then, in January, it won both the 2017 Sydney Taylor Book Award for Younger Readers and the 2016 National Jewish Book Award for Children's Literature. Rebecca Gueorguiev, in her *School Library Journal* review, wrote, "This dynamic offering is an essential purchase." The library committee thought so too. Come check it out.
